Should You Be the Judge?

"Judge not, that ye be not judged. For with what judgment ye judge, ye shall be judged:" (Matthew 7:1-2)

"Judge not, that you be not judged." (v.1) The word for judge is the Greek word "krino," a word which has twelve different shades of meaning. It can mean to *choose*, to *separate*, to *determine*, to *adjudicate*. But sometimes it means <u>to condemn in a critical fashion</u>. That is the meaning of the word in <u>Matthew 7:1</u>.

Election year politics is a brutal time in our country. It seems every commercial has something bad to say about the other candidate, and just the change in the music playing during the commercial, lets you know that their candidate is better. We are encouraged to judge this other candidate by what they tell us he/she stands for. Of course, all the bad things they say about the other candidate is quicky deemed "misinformation."

Jewish Rabbis in Jesus day taught that there were six great works that brought a man credit in this world and profit in the world to come: "*study, visiting the sick, hospitality, devotion in prayer, the education of children in the law, and thinking the best of other people.*"

Pastors and church leaders know a little about this topic as well. In his book <u>"Men Sent from God,"</u> Richard DeHaan lists some of the criticisms pastors receive. "If the pastor is young, they say he lacks experience. If his hair is gray, he is too old for the young people. If he has five or six children, he is irresponsible; if he has no children, he is setting a bad example. If he uses a lot of illustrations, he neglects the Bible; if he does not use enough, he is not relevant. If he condemns wrong deeds, he's cranky; if he does not, he's compromising. If he drives an old car, he shames his congregation; if he drives a new one, he's setting his affection on earthly things and living above his means."

DeHaan's point is that criticism is part and parcel of the public life of the ministry. In fact, criticism is part of living, period. You cannot do anything without being criticized by someone-whether you are selling newspapers, knitting a sweater, working your farm, or mowing your lawn. The ever-present fact is, people are by nature critical and condemning.

Someone said, "There are only 3 ways people will not criticize or talk about you; if you DO nothing, SAY nothing, or HAVE nothing. Otherwise, prepare yourself, because someone is talking about you."

When it comes to calling a pastor, I am often reminded of the story about one young man that was struggling to find the perfect prospective wife his mother would approve of. Every time he brought a prospect home, his mother criticized her unmercifully. The young man was at his wit's end when a friend offered this advice: <u>"Find someone like your mother."</u> Sounds like good advice, right? So, he looked and looked until he found a clone. She looked like his mother, she walked like his mother's, she talked like his mother, and she even thought like his mother. It was amazing! So, he took her home. The next time he saw the friend who had given the advice and was asked how his mother liked the girl, the young bachelor answered, "It went great. My mother loved her, but my father couldn't stand her."

It's difficult in our present time to pick-up a newspaper or watch or listen to the news these days, and not hear a critical, condemning, chastising spirit coming from the speaker or writer. The media, our social relationships, our schooling, and our work situations are immersed in it. However, the greatest tragedy is that the church of Jesus Christ is itself full of those who make a habit of criticism and condemnation. I'm convinced that many believe that criticism is their spiritual gift, because they do it so well.

There are far too many critics of people who serve in the church, from people who don't serve. If you feel you could do better... you should do so. To drive the point of how foolish a critical attitude can be, Jesus gave an illustration - vv. 3-4. With words, Jesus pictured the action a critical spirit causes. Imagine the foolishness of a man with a beam or log in his eye trying to remove a splinter from another's eye!

We are seldom aware of the struggles others are facing in this life. As my grandmother use to say, "Walk a mile in someone else's shoes and you might have a different perspective."
