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"One Nation Under God"

The phrase *"one Nation under God"* is a deeply ingrained part of American identity and patriotism, prominently featured in the Pledge of Allegiance. Its inclusion marks a significant evolution in the country's cultural and legal history. Understanding how this phrase became a defining element of American national identity requires a journey through the country's political and religious landscape.

Early Foundations

America's foundation was heavily influenced by religious motivations. The earliest European settlers, particularly the Pilgrims and Puritans, sought religious freedom and established colonies with strong religious foundations. The Declaration of Independence, penned by Thomas Jefferson in 1776, made reference to a "Creator" and *"Nature's God,"* reflecting the Enlightenment ideals that merged belief in a higher power with rational governance.

The Rise of Civil Religion

The concept of civil religion in America began to take shape in the early 19th century. Civil religion is the implicit religious values of a nation, as expressed through public rituals, symbols, and ceremonies. The Founding Fathers advocated for the separation of church and state, as enshrined in the First Amendment, yet they also recognized the importance of religion in the moral fabric of the nation.

The Civil War and National Identity

The Civil War (1861-1865) was a pivotal moment for national identity. President Abraham Lincoln frequently invoked divine guidance and purpose in his speeches, including the Gettysburg Address, which referred to the nation being *"under God."* This language helped to frame the struggle as a moral crusade and began to solidify the notion of America being under divine providence.

The Cold War and "Under God" in the Pledge

The phrase "under God" was officially added to the Pledge of Allegiance in 1954, during the Cold War. This period was marked by intense rivalry between the United States and the Soviet Union, with the latter promoting atheistic communism. In 1952, President Harry Truman established the National Day of Prayer, and in 1956, "In God We Trust" was adopted as the national motto.

The addition of *"under God"* to the Pledge was driven by a desire to differentiate the U.S. from the Soviet Union. President Dwight D. Eisenhower, a key figure in this movement, declared that the phrase would reaffirm the transcendence of religious faith in America's heritage and future. On Flag Day, June 14, 1954, Eisenhower signed the bill into law, and the phrase became an official part of the Pledge.

Legal and Cultural Debates

The inclusion of *"under God"* in the Pledge has not been without controversy. Legal challenges have been raised, arguing that it violates the Establishment Clause of the First Amendment. However, the courts have generally upheld its constitutionality, viewing it as a reflection of civil religion rather than an endorsement of a specific religious doctrine.

President Ronald Reagan said, "If we ever forget that we are one nation under God, then we will be a nation gone under."


